ULTRA-STABLE TEMPERATURE CONTROLLER

The TC LAB series of temperature controllers integrates high-end Digital Control with a precision output current drive stage to offer the best stability temperature control instrument commercially available today. Many different sensors can be used in the feedback loop including thermistors, RTDs, linear current and voltage sensors, and Wavelength's newest addition – the IR remote temperature sensor for monitoring the temperature of liquids and solids remotely, avoiding contact or contamination with the sample.

Three models are available driving 5A, 10A, or 15A maximum with 15 V (20 V for TC15) compliance to the thermoelectric or resistive heater.

Safety features protect the thermoelectric [TE] and its load. Over and under temperature limits as well as positive and negative current limits can be set. If the sensor signal is lost or a short is detected at the TE, output current is disabled. If temperature limits are exceeded, TE current is disabled and a signal to the active load can be sent to disable its current. For example, connect the LD Shutdown BNC output to the Active Lock input on Wavelength's QCL LAB driver and the QCL current will shut down if temperature limits are exceeded. An Auxiliary Sensor can be used to monitor the temperature of the system heatsink.

INTUITIVE USER INTERFACE AND SUPERIOR REMOTE CONTROL

With Wavelength's plug and play instrument, you have the ability to quickly set the controls using either the instrument touchscreen or a remote computer.

INTELLITUNE: INTELLIGENT AUTOTUNE

Wavelength's proprietary IntelliTune algorithm characterizes the TE/sensor system's response to the controller and determines the optimal PID control coefficients. It then automatically adjusts the PID control values as setpoint, tuning mode, or bias current change.

Run IntelliTune easily just off ambient and watch it change PID settings for a much higher or lower setpoint. After a single scan, explore either optimized Setpoint Response or Disturbance Rejection performance with your load to see which works best. Add or remove the D term to see if noise is an issue. IntelliTune lets you skip the manual characterization and it's smart enough to really work—very little adjustment is needed after you have stored a successful characterization scan. See Application Note AN-TC13 for an in depth exploration.

APPLICATIONS

The advanced and reliable circuitry of the TC LAB Series instruments achieve better than 0.0009°C temperature stability with thermistors.

The ultra-stable temperature controller instruments are particularly reliable for diverse fields such as medical, defense, communications and manufacturing. Applications include particle and droplet measurement, communications, manufacturing test, and medical systems. Additionally, our products are designed for use with electro-optical systems, airborne instrumentation, spectroscopic monitors, and medical diagnostic equipment.

The TC LAB instrument has no user-serviceable parts. Other than the fuses, the TC LAB instrument is not designed to be maintained by the user nor does it contain any parts that can be repaired by the user. All maintenance and repairs must be performed by Wavelength or the warranty will be void.



Use a soft cloth to remove dust from the TC LAB instrument. Do not expose the TC LAB instrument to any liquids, sprays, or solvents. To avoid electrical shock, unplug the power cord before cleaning the instrument.



Before connecting to the power source, make sure the correct cables for your area are set.

WARNINGS



Position the TC LAB instrument so that access to the Main Power On/Off switch on the back panel is easily accessed.



Do not use the TC LAB instrument if there is evidence of damage from shipping; damaged equipment can present significant safety hazards. If you suspect the TC LAB instrument is damaged, contact Wavelength technical support before attempting to operate the instrument.



To avoid electrical shock, use the recommended earth-grounded power cables and properly earth-grounded, 3-prong receptacles only. Failure to follow this precaution can result in severe injury.

The instrument may not be operated at measuring category II, III, and IV mains power circuits. In accordance with EN 601010-1:2010, the instrument has been designed without a rated measuring category and may only be used at direct voltage circuits with up to 240VAC without transient overvoltages



Operating safety is no longer assured in the event of modification or alteration. The instrument may only be opened by authorized service technicians. Never operate the instrument at a higher voltage than specified in the technical data. The instrument may otherwise be destroyed or permanently damaged.

POWER CORDS

- The power cord acts as the power disconnecting device between the AC mains and TC LAB instrument.
- This equipment is grounded through the AC power cord grounding conductor.
- Use only the earth-grounded power cords that are recommended in this
 user quide.
- Route power cords and other cables so that they cannot be damaged.
- Position the TC LAB instrument in a location that makes it easy to quickly disconnect the power cord.
- To avoid fire hazard, use only the specified power cords with the correct grounding, voltage, and current ratings.

FUSES

- Disconnect the power to the TC LAB instrument before changing the fuses.
- To prevent damage to the TC LAB instrument when replacing fuses, locate and correct the problem that caused the fuse to blow before reapplying power.

QUICK CONNECT GUIDE

CONNECT THE POWER

On the back panel, insert the female end of the IEC AC power cable into the Power receptacle and then plug the male end into the AC power source.

NOTE: Place the TC LAB instrument at least 6" away from any wall to provide adequate ventilation and prevent overheating.

WIRE A TEST LOAD

We recommend using a test load and simulated thermistor when configuring the TC LAB instrument. The thermistor test load simulates a 10 k Ω thermistor operating at 25°C.

Wire a test load to a 15 + 2 D-SUB plug and insert the plug into the **TE Out and Sensor D-SUB** port located on the back panel.




Figure 1. Test Load Wiring Schematic

Setting up this test load allows current to be driven to either the positive or negative limit. Choose units of resistance and change the setpoint above or below the 10k Ω value. This confirms proper operation and direction of the current flow.

TURN ON POWER

- 1. Press the **Power** switch on the back panel to the | position. The front panel power button light slowly pulses.
- 2. Press the **Power** button on the front panel, the button illuminates, touchscreen is activated, and the Control screen is active.

NOTE: Turning off front **Power** button powers down the application electronics and puts the unit into Standby mode. Turning off rear **Power** switch powers down all electronics and some settings return to factory default.

SET THE LIMITS



- 1. Press to access the Limit Screen.
- On the Limit screen, press the blue Limit Current values and rotate the Adjustment knob to change to the desired values. The instrument will beep when set.

Temperature limits can be set on this screen. The setpoint is restricted by these limits.

The positive and negative current settings indicate the direction of flow during heating and cooling.

CHOOSE A CONTROL SENSOR



- 1. Press to access the Sensor Screen.
- Press the sensor name and turn the adjustment knob to cycle through the factory defaults or any User Defined sensors.

Choose the sensor to match the test load or the appropriate sensor for the test load. Additionally, thermistors require choosing the correct bias current.

The test load suggested by Wavelength uses a $10k\Omega$ 100μ A thermistor configuration.

ADJUST SETPOINT



- 1. Press to access the Control Screen.
- Press the blue Setpoint temperature value and turn the Adjustment knob to change it. The instrument will beep when set.

NOTES: The Control screen is on by default when the instrument is turned on.

The Control screen is also the location of the PID control parameters, IntelliTune (intelligent autotune), and the Temperature Scan function. To change any of the PID values, press the number and turn the Adjustment knob until the desired value is displayed.

ENABLE CURRENT

Press the ENABLE button. There is no delay before the button illuminates and the current flows.

SHUTDOWN THE INSTRUMENT

If the Enable button is illuminated, current is still flowing to the test load. Before shutting down, the current needs to be turned off.

- 1. Press the Enable button. The button light will turn off and current to the test load will stop.
- On the front panel, press the Power button. The touchscreen will go black but the button light slowly pulses blue to indicate that the back Power button is still on. NOTE: Turning off only the front Power button puts the instrument in Standby mode.
- On the back panel, press the power switch to the O position. The instrument will shut down.




Figure 2. Female 9-Pin D-SUB




Figure 4. Female 15+2 D-SUB




Figure 3. LD Shutdown BNC Pins

ESD INFORMATION

Before proceeding, it is critical that you take precautions to prevent electrostatic discharge (ESD) damage to the load. ESD damage can result from improper handling of sensitive electronics, and is easily preventable with simple precautions.

THEORY OF OPERATION

The TC LAB Series are high-current temperature controllers that deliver bidirectional current to Peltier Effect thermoelectric coolers (TE), or unidirectional current to resistive heaters (RH). The fundamental operating principle is that the controller adjusts the output drive current in order to change the temperature of the sensor that is connected to the thermal load. The goal is to make the sensor temperature match the setpoint temperature, and then keep them equal in spite of changes to ambient conditions and variations in thermal load.


While output is enabled, the controller continuously compares the setpoint temperature and the actual sensor temperature. If there is a difference between the two, the controller adjusts the output current—thereby driving the TE or heater to heat or cool—until the difference is zero.

The controller includes features that help protect the load from damage, and also make it more versatile in a wide array of applications.

- Current limits: the adjustable current limits must be set correctly in order to avoid over-driving and damaging the TE or heater.
- Control loop: the controller employs a smart Proportional-Integrated-Derivative control loop to adjust the drive current. The terms are user-adjustable and, when properly configured, will quickly settle the load temperature with minimal overshoot and ringing.
- Voltage Limit: The voltage to the TE can be limited through remote commands.
- Temperature Limits: Set high and low temperature limits
 to either report an over temperature condition at the load
 or use them to trigger a Shutdown signal to turn off a Laser
 Diode / QCL or other device driver to eliminate the active
 heat load and protect the device. Additionally, if temperature
 limits are exceeded, TE current will be disabled.
- Sensor Disconnect/Failure Protection: If a short or open circuit is detected at the sensor, the output current is disabled.
- **TE Failure Protection:** If a short is detected across the thermoelectric, the output current is also disabled.
- IntelliTune: Wavelength's proprietary algorithm characterizes the TE / Sensor system's response to the TC LAB temperature controller and determines the optimal PID control coefficients. Then it automatically adjusts the PID control values as setpoint, tuning mode, or bias current are changed.

These instructions are for operating the TC LAB Series instrument. Fuses are provided and installed. We recommend using a test load until you are familiar with operation of the instrument.

WIRE A SENSOR AND TEST LOAD

Wire a 15 + 2 D-SUB plug to a test load and insert it into the **TE Out** and **Sensor D-SUB** port located on the back panel.




Figure 5. Test Load Wiring Schematic

Setting up this test load allows current to be driven to either the positive or negative limit. Choose units of resistance and change the setpoint above or below the 10k Ω value. This confirms proper operation and direction of the current flow.

After practicing with a test load to gain comfort and proficiency with the operation of the instrument, wire the sensor and thermoelectric or resistive heater.

WIRE A SENSOR

Be sure to wire the sensor to the correct pins on the TE/Sensor D-Sub. Wiring depends on which type of sensor is used.





Figure 6. Thermistor Wiring Schematic






Figure 7. RTD Wiring Schematics




Figure 8. AD590 Wiring Schematic




Figure 9. LM335 Wiring Schematic




Figure 10. IR Sensor Wiring Schematic

WIRE AN AUXILIARY THERMISTOR SENSOR




Figure 11. Auxiliary Sensor Schematic

An auxiliary sensor can be used to monitor the temperature of a secondary location in your system, such as the heatsink temperature. To do this, wire a $10k\Omega$ thermistor to Pins 14 and 15. The sensor temperature reports on the Monitor screen.

WIRE A TEC OR RH LOAD

Wire a thermoelectric controller (TEC) or a resistive heater (RH) using Pins A1 and A2 on the 15+2 D-SUB.




Figure 12. TEC Wiring Diagram




Figure 13. RH Wiring Diagram




Figure 14. Front Panel

FRONT PANEL FUNCTIONS

NOTE: Turning off front **Power** button powers down the application electronics and puts the unit into standby mode. Turning off rear **Power** switch powers down all electronics and some settings return to factory default.

SET LIMITS



- 1. Press to access the Limit Screen.
- Press + Limit Current, Limit Current, Max Temp, and/or Min Temp values and rotate the adjustment knob to change each value. The instrument will beep when set.




Figure 15. Limit Screen

NOTES:

- The Limit Currents should not exceed the damage current threshold of the thermoelectric. To operate a resistive heater, set one limit to OFF.
- The Max Temp and Min Temp can be set. If the actual sensor temperature exceeds these limits, this status is reported remotely so the user can take action.
- A TTL signal is sent from the LDShutdown BNC to trigger an interlock in a laser diode or QCL driver, if the actual temperature exceeds the limit(s) specified. The factory default polarity is ACTIVE HI. The polarity can be changed through remote commands.
- The laser shutdown signal requires that a BNC to BNC cable is installed between the LDShutdown on the TC LAB and the Active Lock on the QCL LAB.

SELECT A SENSOR

The sensor choice determines the sensor voltage to temperature relationship and which sensor pins are monitored on the 15+2 D-SUB.



- 1. Press to access the Sensor Screen.
- Press the blue sensor name and turn the adjustment knob to cycle through the factory default sensor types or any user-defined sensors that were defined remotely.

The thermistor name includes the resistance at 25°C and the bias current base selection. See the TCS datasheets for the Resistance vs. Temperature charts and Steinhart-Hart coefficients. The TC LAB auto-ranges the bias current by default. The current level in the sensor name merely defines the temperature range over which the sensor is calibrated.




Figure 16. Sensor Screen




Figure 17. Thermistor Calibration Screen




Figure 18. RTD Calibration Screen




Figure 19. Linear Voltage Calibration Screen




Figure 20. Linear Current Calibration Screen




Figure 21. IR Sensor Calibration Screen




Figure 22. Control Screen




Figure 23. Monitor Screen

Signed thermoelectric current, TE voltage, and actual sensor voltage are displayed. The signal from the auxiliary sensor is converted to temperature using a $10k\Omega$ thermistor with $100\mu A$ bias current calibration values.

ENABLE CURRENT

Press the ENABLE button. There is no delay before the button illuminates and the current flows.

Once the current is enabled, the actual temperature should move toward the setpoint temperature. (See the **Troubleshooting** section if it does not.)

Once the actual temperature is near the setpoint, a green target symbol is displayed to indicate that the actual temperature is within the specified tolerance window around the setpoint. Tolerance is set on the Settings screen.

SCAN THE TEMPERATURE



- On the Control screen, press to access the temperature scan screen.
- 2. Press the **Start Temp** value to select the temperature at which to start the scan. Turn the adjustment knob to change it.
- 3. Press the **Stop Temp** value to select the temperature at which to stop the scan.
- Press the Step Size value to select the temperature interval at which to take a measurement.
- 5. Press the **Time Interval** value to select the amount of time to allow the temperature to settle.
- Insert the USB flash drive in the USB DATA slot on the front panel.



7. Press the **Start Scan** button to start the scan. When finished, data is saved to the USB flash drive with the filename tcscanxx.txt, where xx starts at 00 and increments.



To stop mid-scan, press the red **Stop Scan** button. Any data collected during the aborted scan is saved to the USB flash drive.




Figure 24. Scan Screen

The tolerance window can be very useful during a scan. Change the time interval to STABLE by rotating the knob counter clockwise. When the temperature reaches the setpoint ± the tolerance window, a datapoint is recorded and the instrument increments the setpoint to the next indicated value. Ideally, the tolerance should be set very tight, much less than the scan step.

Time Offset, Setpoint, Actual Temp, Sensor Voltage, TE Current, and TE Voltage are stored to the data file.

Exiting the Scan screen aborts the scan. After the scan is complete, the current remains enabled and at the final scan setpoint.

To trigger a datapoint from another instrument at a given temperature, use the TTL TempStable output or the remote TEC Condition Register In Tolerance bit to trigger the measurement.

NOTE: Scan only in temperature mode. Resistance mode is not supported.

INTELLITUNE: INTELLIGENT AUTOTUNE

IntelliTune adjusts the PID coefficients, as well as the voltage limit.

1. Turn off the output current.



 On the CONTROL screen, press Tune mode to choose either Setpoint Response or Disturbance Rejection.

Setpoint Response: This setting has a fast time to temperature and will overshoot.

Disturbance Rejection: This setting has a quick return to setpoint after stability is reached. It is best for pulsing laser or active loads, or if ambient temperature fluctuates.

Manual Tuning: Turns IntelliTune off.




Figure 25. Control Screen

- 3. On the Limits screen, set Max/Min Temperature Limits.
- 4. Adjust the setpoint off ambient temperature by about 5°C.
- Make sure the setpoint will not cause a sensor bias current change by choosing a setpoint between 0.625 to 11.25 V. The scan is completed at a single bias current level.
 - 6. Press to start a characterization scan.



NOTES: The process takes three sweeps and can take several minutes. The "note" icon fills with red to indicate a scan is in progress. If any portion of the icon is red and you want to stop the process, press the "note" icon to abort the session. If the session is aborted, the PID

coefficients revert to the previously used coefficients.

When the characterization process is complete, the new PID coefficients display and the icon reverts to green.

Tune only in temperature mode. Resistance mode is not supported.

INTELLITUNE CONTINUOUSLY OPTIMIZES

Once a system is run through the IntelliTune process, the PID coefficents are adjusted as the setpoint, tune mode, or bias current is changed. Adjustments are made even if bias current changes or setpoint approaches ambient temperature. The IntelliTune setpoint does not need to match the system setpoint if the system setpoint is very high or very low. Run IntelliTune at a setpoint about 5° away from ambient. IntelliTune stops if the sensor is changed or the tuning mode is set to Manual Tuning.

During an IntelliTune process, the current limits are set to 10% of the initial values. The limit icon glows red frequently. Current limits are restored after the scan is complete.

See Application Note AN-TC13 for an in-depth exploration of IntelliTune.




Figure 26. Save / Recall Screen

- Press the **Display** value to cycle through the display and control units available - Celcius (°C), Farenheit (°F), Kelvin (K) or Resistance.




Figure 28. Status/Enable 9-pin D-SUB

REMOTE ENABLE INPUT (PINS 1 & 2)

This is a TTL signal that will override the front panel ENABLE button. The default polarity is ENABLE HIGH. Enter 0V to disable the output regardless of the front panel enable button. An internal 100 k Ω pull up resistor means no external voltage is required for front panel operation with the default polarity. The polarity can be changed by remote command.

ENABLE STATUS (PINS 5 & 6)

This is a TTL signal that goes HI when the output current is enabled.

AT TEMPERATURE STATUS (PINS 5 & 7)

This is a TTL signal that goes HI when the actual temperature is within the window defined by setpoint +/- tolerance.

FAN CURRENT DRIVE (PINS 8 & 9)

This output will drive 12 V up to 0.5 A to power a fan for airflow across the thermoelectric and load. The auxiliary thermistor can monitor the temperature of the load heatsink.




Figure 29. Fuse Box

REMOTE OPERATION

The TC LAB can be controlled by a remote computer using the Command Set (see the <u>LAB Series Command Set User Guide</u>) or with a LabVIEW Virtual Instrument application (see the Virtual Instrument User Guide).

SHUTDOWN THE INSTRUMENT

If the Enable button is illuminated, current is still flowing to the test load. Before shutting down, the current needs to be turned off.

- 1. Press the Enable button. The button light will turn off and current to the test load will stop.
- On the front panel, press the Power button. The touchscreen will go black but the button light slowly pulses blue to indicate that the back Power button is still on. NOTE: Turning off only the front Power button puts the instrument in Standby mode.
- On the back panel, press the power switch to the O position. The instrument will shut down.

UPDATE THE FIRMWARE

The firmware can be updated on the instrument using a USB flash drive.

- 1. On the Wavelength Electronics website, navigate to one of the following download locations:
 - » The <u>Temperature Controller tab</u> on the Support Software Download page.

OR

- » Download & Design Tools tab on the <u>TC5 LAB</u>, <u>TC10 LAB</u>, or <u>TC15 LAB</u> product pages.
- 2. Save the file to the hard drive of a computer.
- Extract the files from the ZIP file downloaded from the website. This can be done in Windows by right clicking on the ZIP file, and clicking Extract AII.
- 4. Copy the files to a USB flash drive.
- Verify on the flash drive that the files are present. There should be a subfolder named TCxx-LAB, and a file named INSTALL.INI in the root of the flash drive.
- 6. Eject the flash drive from the computer.
- 7. Turn the instrument completely off at the rear panel.
- 8. Insert the USB flash drive into the front Data Port and turn on the rear power switch.
- Follow the onscreen instructions to install the update.
 When notified on the screen that the installation is complete, remove the flash drive and then click OK to reboot the instrument.







Figure 33. IR Sensor Calibration School

EMISSIVITY

All objects radiate infrared (or thermal) energy but do not radiate equally. Emissivity is the measure of the ability of an object to radiate this energy, which, in turn, indicates the temperature of the surface. Emissivity is expressed as a value between 0 and 1.0, with 0 indicating no infrared energy and 1.0 the absolute maximum.

A blackbody is a material that perfectly emits heat energy and has a maximum emissivity value of 1.0. All other materials are measured against the blackbody and have a value that is a fraction of this. On the opposite end of the scale, an infrared mirror has an emissivity value of 0. In actuality, there are no perfect blackbodies and very few perfect mirrors.

The measurement is the percent of the potential energy that can be emitted. For example, if an object has the potential to emit 100 units but only emits 90, then the emissivity value is 0.9. The value accuracy of a material can also vary according to texture and color at the time a measurement is taken.

When determining the emissivity value, several properties of the material must be taken into consideration.

Use the following guidelines to optimize the surface temperature measurements:

- Shield the object from surrounding temperature sources to avoid reflections.
- Whenever possible, coat the surface of the arget object with a black flat finish paint for more accurate measurements.

When measuring translucent materials, make background is uniform and lower in temperature.




Figure 34. ThermAle: Adjustable Mounting Bracket Dimensions






Figure 35. IR Sensor Dimensions




Figure 38. WCB405 Wiring Diagram (not included)




Figure 39. WCB406 Wiring Diagram (not included)
